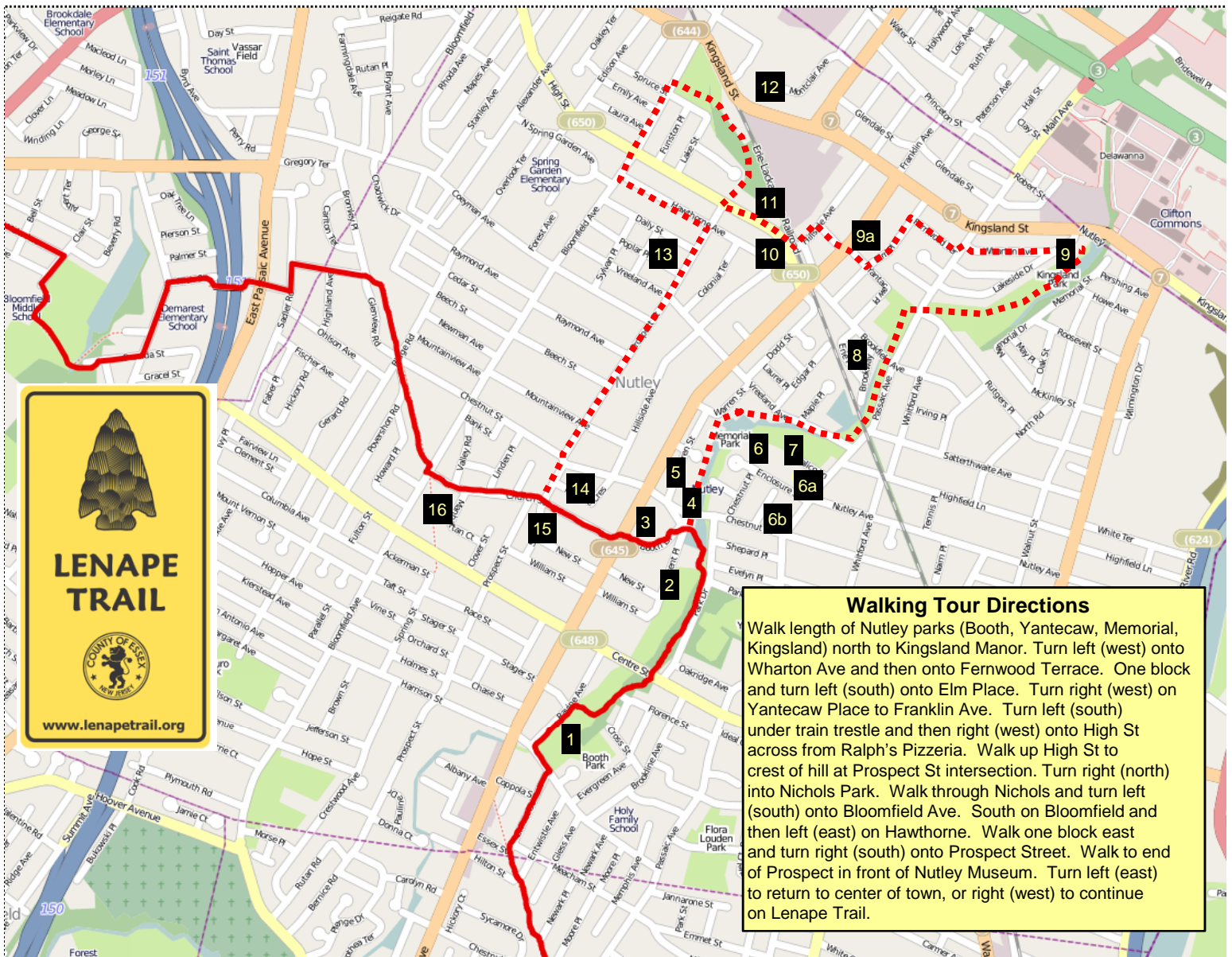


The Lenape Trail: A Walking Tour of Nutley



Walking Tour Directions

Walk length of Nutley parks (Booth, Yantecaw, Memorial, Kingsland) north to Kingsland Manor. Turn left (west) onto Wharton Ave and then onto Fernwood Terrace. One block and turn left (south) onto Elm Place. Turn right (west) on Yantecaw Place to Franklin Ave. Turn left (south) under train trestle and then right (west) onto High St across from Ralph's Pizzeria. Walk up High St to crest of hill at Prospect St intersection. Turn right (north) into Nichols Park. Walk through Nichols and turn left (south) onto Bloomfield Ave. South on Bloomfield and then left (east) on Hawthorne. Walk one block east and turn right (south) onto Prospect Street. Walk to end of Prospect in front of Nutley Museum. Turn left (east) to return to center of town, or right (west) to continue on Lenape Trail.

| <ul style="list-style-type: none"> 1 Nutley's Booth, Yantecaw, Memorial and Kingsland Parks together represent one of the nation's oldest 'linear park' systems. 2 Vincent Methodist Church, built 1909 on site of old Yantico mill building (wool mill) 3 Nutley Park Oval. The heart of Nutley used for recreation and school activities since 1894 4 Vreeland House. CA mid 1700's, now Womens Club 5 Bank of Nutley. Built 1926. Building has gone through a complete historical renovation. A must see. 6 Enclosure historic district. Home to many famous authors and artists. 6a Original Nutley Public Library, 381 Passaic Ave built 1904. Now a private residence 6b Olde Town Center (Chestnut & Passaic) The heart of Nutley's early retail days. 7 Mason House. Calico Lane. Built 1812 | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> 8 Erie Place historic district. CA 1873. Homes built for employees of the U.S. Express Company. 9 Kingsland Manor. Built late 1700s 9a Beautiful old homes all along Elm Street down to Brookfield Avenue 10 Lambert Square. Site of old train station, Masonic hall, and office of William Lambert, architect. 11 Old falls. Provided water for steam turbines to provide Nutley with some of its first electricity. Placards currently mark the spot. 12 Old Eaton Stone Circus, now Hoffman LaRoche. Annie Oakley would frequently visit this winter circus headquarters. 13 Prospect Heights district. Many fine Lambert style homes still exist here. 14 Franklin Reformed Church. Built 1861. 15 Nutley Museum. 65 Church St. Built in 1875 as a school. 16 Abram Speer House. 149 Church St. Built CA 1760. |
